#### Suggested park addition:

#### Horseshoe Pitching Courts at Stoneridge Creek Neighborhood Park

Walter V. Morgan December 2016

#### BACKGROUND

Pitching horseshoes is an excellent recreational activity, but it is under-represented in Pleasanton. There are two public facilities, but they are minimal by any standards, and used very little. This memorandum is a suggestion that building a new facility for pitching horseshoes in the Stoneridge Creek Neighborhood Park (SCNP) would be an effective and inexpensive way to add horseshoe pitching to the Pleasanton Parks recreational activities schedule.

#### **OBJECTIVE**

The space immediately west of the tennis courts in the Stoneridge Creek Neighborhood Park is of suitable size for horseshoe pitching courts, and it is presently occupied by only shrubs and small trees. In addition, its location near the Stoneridge Creek Retirement Community means that it is very close to a sizeable pool of potential users. It is expected that the cost of construction and maintenance of such a facility would be minimal.

#### STATUS OF PLEASANTON PUBLIC VENUES

Pleasanton currently has two public horseshoe pitching venues, one in the Amador Valley Community Park and the other at the Pleasanton Senior Center.





The horseshoe pitching facility in Amador Valley Community Park. The area is nicely fenced, but other than that consists only of two sets of stakes and two benches.





The horseshoe pitching facility at the Senior Center has four courts, consisting only of backstops and four sets of stakes. There is very limited use of either facility, in part because of their minimal nature and in part because they have not been promoted. Promotional efforts for these facilities would likely be unproductive unless they were first improved by adding pitching platforms and pits. It would not be expensive to provide those features.

#### STATUS: Alameda County Fairgrounds

There is an excellent horseshoe pitching facility with 16 regulation courts at the Alameda County Fairgrounds, but it is under lock and key, and available only to the Tri-Valley Horseshoe Pitching Club (a National Horseshoe Pitching Association affiliate). This can be considered a regional facility (not local), since few of the club members live in Pleasanton. NHPA-sanctioned tournaments are held there several times each year, attracting pitchers of all skill levels from clubs throughout northern California.

## STATUS: Stoneridge Creek Retirement Community

A temporary court meeting many of the NHPA court specifications is available on the campus of Stoneridge Creek. It is readily available to all Stoneridge Creek residents, and is occasionally used by guests. It is, however, located within the Stoneridge Creek North Phase construction zone. When construction progress makes it necessary for the temporary court to be removed, the currently active pitchers are unlikely to travel the three to five miles necessary to use the courts at Amador Valley Community Park or the Pleasanton Senior Center. It is expected that they would all continue to be active if courts were added at SCNP.

### **DETAILS APPLICABLE TO STONERIDGE CREEK NEIGHBORHOOD PARK**Location

The site suggested for horseshoe pitching courts at SCNP is indicated on the aerial view below, from Google Maps. (Since the photo was taken, a sidewalk has been added south of the area, and CarMax has added a fence on the north side.) It is recommended that two to four courts be built, the actual number depending largely on the incremental cost of each added court. It is expected that there would be simultaneous use of two courts frequently, three courts sometimes, four courts occasionally, more on rare occasions. (Dimensions of the suggested SCNP site are known only approximately, but it is believed that there would be space for as many as six courts.)



#### Site preparation

In addition to construction of the actual courts, the major tasks involved in constructing courts at SCNP are expected to be:

- a) removal of some shrubs and small trees
- b) re-routing of some irrigation lines
- c) addition of a peripheral fence
- d) addition of a water tap (for pit maintenance and cleaning of tools)
- e) addition of a storage unit for maintenance tools (shovel, rake, watering can)
- f) addition of two or more benches
- g) provision for mounting a scorekeeping board.
- h) addition of bark or other ground cover

#### Construction details

The basic features associated with each NHPA regulation court include:


- two pits (each 3 feet by 4 feet inside, bordered with concrete or timber);
- pit material (sand; approximately one-quarter yard each pit);
- steel stakes (one-inch diameter, ~3 feet long);
- anchors for the stakes (concrete or timber)
- pitching platforms (concrete preferred, 18 inches wide);
- walkways (concrete preferred, 18 inches wide)
- wooden backstops

#### HOW TO BUILD A HORSESHOE PITCHING COURT

The diagram to the right, from an NHPA publication, gives the dimensions and space requirements for an NHPA regulation court. The minimum spacing requirement between court centerlines is 12 feet. It is also recommended that an array of courts be enclosed by fences spaced 56 feet or more in the pitching direction. The approximate minimum fenced-space requirement for two courts would then be 56 feet by 24 feet, with an additional 12 to 15 feet of width required for each additional court. The width requirement might also be increased by adding space for benches, a score-keeping device, and storage for maintenance tools.

Note that the diagram indicates that the pit material may be either clay or sand. The very good players prefer clay, but sand is a much better choice for neighborhood courts. Sand is much less expensive, and much easier to maintain. To perform properly, clay must be within a narrow range of moisture content, and that becomes a significant maintenance problem.

There are several ways to anchor a stake accurately and securely; the one shown in this diagram may not be the best choice.



#### OTHER HORSESHOE PITCHING VENUES

The photos on this page are of courts that are in active use. They show a variety of approaches to the construction of backstops and pitching platforms.

#### **CONCLUSION**

Please give consideration to this request for adding horseshoe pitching courts to the Stoneridge Creek Neighborhood Park. It is expected that the cost would be minimal because a suitable space is available. The benefits would be immediate because there is currently an active group of participants nearby. The location would also attract new users from the eastern part of Pleasanton.

A longer-range view of horseshoe pitching as a recreational program would add courts to the planned community center south of Bernal Avenue, and upgrade the existing venues at Amador Valley Community Park and the Senior Center. The result would be venues well-distributed geographically across Pleasanton.

Request for Inclusion in 2017 Work Plan Priorities List – Lester Family / Shiners Hospital Property Development

Dear Mayor Thorne & Councilmembers:

This letter requests that the City Council include the Lester/Shiners Property development in its 2017 Priorities Work Plan due to the substantial donation of open space and related public amenities provided by the application. In summary, the benefits to the community warranting consideration for inclusion in the 2017 priority work plan are:

- Donation of public open space totally approximately 66 acres to the East Bay Regional Parks
  District (EBRPD), when combined with private HOA open spaces will total 112 acres of
  permanent open space
- Construction of a EBRPD public staging area for hikers, bikers, and equestrians to include a restroom facility
- Construction of Dublin Canyon Road frontage improvements to provide bicycle lanes per the City's Complete Streets Policy to include a roadway upgrade at the DeVaney creek culvert
- Improve public safety by upgrading an existing water tank and installing a new tank for domestic use and fire protection of surrounding open spaces

The 123 acre project site fronts on the south side of Dublin Canyon Road, generally between Canyon Creek Circle and Canyon Meadows Drive and consists of two contiguous properties. The Lester Family, who have resided on the premises since 1906, owns a majority of the site, or approximately 110 acres. The Shriners Hospital for Children (Shriners) owns the abutting approximate 12.5 acre property along Dublin Canyon Road to the north of the Lester's property. The Oak Knolls Congregation (Jevovah Witness) also owns property abutting the Lesters and the Shriners but is not being developed as part of the project, however, an access easement will allow an emergency vehicle access (EVA) roadway connection to Dublin Canyon Road for both the congregation and the new homes. Because the Lester Family wishes to remain living on the property, two new homes will replace their existing houses at their same approximate locations along Dublin Canyon Road. Therefore, this 33 lot subdivision will have 31 new homes so the Lesters can continue to reside on their land.

Ponderosa Homes has been working with the East Bay Regional Park District (EBRPD) to create public access for hikers, bikers and equestrians to the northern end of the Pleasanton Ridge trail system. This access will complete the Pleasanton Ridge trail system by providing excellent access to trails and open spaces owned by or planned for acquisition by EBRPD (see attachments). Accordingly, as part of the project, a new staging area will be constructed along the eastern property boundary and adjacent to the seasonal De Vaney Creek to serve as a trail head into the 65 acres of open space dedicated to the EBRPD by the Lester Family outside of the Urban Growth Boundary (UGB) as well as access into existing trails to be extended from the abutting Pleasanton Ridge and the Preserve neighborhoods. This acquisition of acreage by the EBRPD for the public's use will complete the Pleasanton Ridge by providing continuous permanent open space with connecting trail systems accessible by a new staging area along Dublin Canyon Road.

A more detailed description of the project is included in the attached Project Description dated January 2017.

Thank you for your considering this request given the considerable public amenities presented by the Project which warrant inclusion in the 2017 City Council Work Plan Priorities.

## PROJECT DESCRIPTION OVERVIEW LESTER & SHRINERS PROPERTIES, PLEASANTON JANUARY 2017

Ponderosa Homes proposes to develop the Lester and Shriners' properties in Pleasanton, CA, as an upscale, executive housing subdivision for the growing needs of Pleasanton's expanding workforce. In addition, Ponderosa is working with the East Bay Regional Parks District (EBRPD) to create public access for hikers, bikers and equestrians to the northern end of the Pleasanton Ridge trail system. This access will complete the Pleasanton Ridge trail system and provide excellent access to the trails and open space properties owned by EBRPD as has been envisioned and proposed over the last 30 years.

The 123 acre project site fronts on the south side Dublin Canyon Road, generally between Canyon Creek Circle and Canyon Meadows Drive, and consists of two contiguous properties. The Lester family, who have resided on the premises since 1906, owns a majority of the site totaling approximately 110 acres. The Shriners Hospital for Children (Shriners) owns the approximate 12.5 acre property along Dublin Canyon Road but to the north of the Lesters property which is also included in the project site design. A gated entry off of Dublin Canyon Road will be installed for the 35 new homes, and given its topographic characteristics, much of the community will be hidden from view only visible from a few locations in Pleasanton, and primarily from the lots situated above the project site located in the Preserve. For clarity, the abutting Oak Hills Congregation (aka Jehovah Witness) property, which is situated between the Lesters and the Shriners, is not part of this application, however, an emergency vehicle access (EVA) will cross a small portion of the congregation's driveway where an existing Lester maintenance road exists.

Thus, a total of 33 homes and lots presented by the project results in a 31 new home, gated community, plus two new homes to replace the two existing Lester homes. For clarity, the two Lester family houses adjacent to Dublin Canyon Road and south of the creek will be removed and replaced at the same approximate location with their two new homes on Lot 32 and Lot 33 so the Lesters can continue to reside on the property. The Lesters will then retain a third parcel referenced as Parcel B to the south of their new homes for continued agricultural use including the construction of a storage building and related ranch type structures but with no allowance for residential use. The remaining 31 new homes to be accessed from the western portion of the site and across the Shriners property via a new private street and gated entrance will be separate from the access to the new Lester homes. The minimum lot size is 7,224 square feet (Lot 10), however, the majority of the new lots will be larger ranging up to 20,261 square feet (Lot 31) with a minimum pad size of 70'x100'. However, the two Lester parcels (Lot 32 and Lot 33) will be will be larger with a maximum of 26,420 square feet. Sheet C3 provides a detailed summary of the lot sizes as well as the FAR and development standards.


The project site is currently located within an unincorporated area of Alameda County and contiguous with the Pleasanton City Limits. Given the designation as being within the Pleasanton Sphere of Influence, and having a Pleasanton General Plan designation of Low Density Residential/Public Health & Safety overlay, the application will request annexation into the City of Pleasanton, along with the appropriate Rezoning, potential General Plan Amendment of Public Health/Safety (PH&S) Overlay to LDR and related entitlement applications. The site

currently has a Prezoning designation of Agriculture and thus the Rezoning to the current General Plan designation of PUD-LDR/OS/A & Grazing/OS, and potentially along with a Public Health & Safety overlay. The aforementioned overlay is generally shown on the General Plan Land Use Map, however, the physical location and extent (acreage) of this designation and its relationship to the project design is being evaluated. All of the development proposed for the site, including grading and open spaces to be maintained by the HOA or potentially a future GHAD will occur within the Urban Growth Boundary ("UGB") which traverses the project site in a north to south alignment following a property line dividing the two contiguous Lester parcels. The Applicant has been actively discussing with the East Bay Regional Park District ("District") the donation of the property outside the UGB (Parcel D) as well as portions of the property which lie along the south side of the creek (Parcel C) abutting an existing EBRPD maintenance roadway. When combined, this approximate 66 acres of future open space would be permanently secured for public's use and enjoyment. As part of that discussion, the Project Sponsors would construct an public roadway and staging area along the southern edge of the Project site to act as a trail head for access to the northern terminus of the Pleasanton Ridge trail system, the design and location of which is to be determined by the District. The existing unpaved roadway to the immediate south of the Lester property will continue to provide access to the adjoining District-owned open space as well as other privately owned lands. Trees will be removed along the edge of this existing unpaved roadway as recommended by the Project arborist where stability and health of trees are at issue, and in some cases, needed to construct the new EBRPD staging facility on Parcel C.

The new streets, gated entryway, landscaped streetscape as well as some open space areas will be privately maintained within the community. An emergency vehicle access (EVA) roadway will be constructed to connect back to Dublin Canyon Road if required, with the Oak Hill congregation second driveway connection. The EVA and Project access road system will also include sewer, water and storm drainage connections for the proposed project. An access road at the uphill end of Street 'A' is provided to allow continued access by the rancher(s) grazing livestock on the open space areas outside of the UGB.

Grading of the site and setbacks have been sensitively designed to avoid impact to the seasonal creek and arroyo vegetation, and to provide transition to the natural grades beyond the building envelopes. All site grading on the Lester property has been designed to avoid grading within areas of 25% slope or greater, except for grading required to construct small road segments at the entry along with a portion along the EVA. The area proposed for development is primarily grassland located in an area of the site that is not visible to the public from Dublin Canyon Road, or other surrounding areas. The major view sheds to the south and southwest, as well as the lands beyond the UGB and any ridgelines will not be affected.

The homes will range in size from 3,200 to 4,100 square feet, with attractively designed two-story facades. Three different floor plans have been designed, each having three elevation styles per plan, in a Mediterranean style consistent with the rolling landscape of the property. A selection of various exterior color schemes will also be designed to provide variation and continuity with the design themes. Landscape elements will be native and native-type species that are drought-tolerant and wind resistant and fit the Mediterranean style. The use of turf will be minimized with the overall goal of conserving water and being complimentary to the natural setting. High efficiency drip irrigation will also reduce outdoor water use.


Development of East Pleasanton

- 1. <u>RESTART?-</u> The persistent developer has returned with a little less land and almost of same plans. Please write your city council to tell them to STOP ALL PLANNING OF EAST PLEASANTON, and STOP planning a huge housing project that most Pleasanton residents do not want!
- 2. <u>MORE HOUSES</u> East Pleasanton/SteelWave project is ALL optional housing, and is not required to meet our high density housing mandates (RHNA). With 2000 high density apartments and new houses under construction, we should evaluate city conditions after they are complete. Plus, it is a well-known fact that new development does not fully cover the costs of providing services and infrastructure for the new residents. This massive project of 889 houses will be built over the next 10-15 years, and will become **one of the BIGGEST housing developments in the history of Pleasanton.**
- 3. <u>INFRASTRUCTURE</u>- One year of rain will not restore aquifers after 5 years of drought. The State of CA has not approved more reservoirs for water storage. Governor Brown stated that despite the recent rains, Californians may need to permanently comply with lower water usage.
